WHAT YOU'LL NEED TO GET STARTED

Before you head off on your adventure, here's a list of items you'll need to complete the activities in your book.

NATURE SOUNDS

Find a quiet spot, close your eyes, and listen. How many different nature sounds do you hear? Hold up your fingers to count them.

Draw or describe what you heard!

Animals communicate through sounds. Birds sing to mark their territory, and frogs croak to attract mates!



Johnson Park is a great place to hear nature. There are big trees, open fields, and even a river.

BIRDWATCHING BINGO

Can you spot these birds? Mark them off as you go!

Robins eat worms in the morning and fruits in the afternoon, and Red-tailed Hawks can spot a mouse from 100 feet away.



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Burrows and nests keep animals protected from weather and predators.

Did you know bugs hide under leaves, on trees, or in the grass? Some bugs even use camouflage to blend in, like Phasmids (stick bugs)!

7 RIVER WATCH

Visit a spot near a river, like the Raritan River at **Donaldson Park. Can you find and draw three wildlife creatures?** Look for fish, bugs, or ducks!



Remember: Stay away from the water's edge, don't go in, and always stay with a grown-up.

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2 SCAVENGER HUNT

Let's find some treasures! Check off each item you find:

Bird Feather

Birds grow new feathers every year to stay warm and fly fast.



Stones get smooth from being tumbled and shaped by water over many years.

Squirrel

Squirrels' front teeth are always growing, so they chew on hard things to keep them short.

Mushroom

Mushrooms are like nature's recyclers, breaking down old plants.

Butterfly

Butterflies taste with their feet.



Visit the Butterfly House at the EARTH Center in Davidson's Mill Pond Park to see butterflies up close and learn how they grow!



3 PINECONE COUNTER

Pinecones come in all shapes and sizes. Count how many you can find at John A. Phillips Park!



Pinecones have scales that protect their seeds. When it's warm and dry, they open and release them.



ATURE'S PATTERNS

Look around, Junior Ranger! Nature is full of patterns — on leaves, in the clouds, even in animal tracks. **How many can you spot** on your adventure?

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5 CHAMPION TREE CHALLENGE

Can you find the largest tree in the park? It's likely been growing for many years! Ask your grown-up to help you find its height and circumference and write them down below.

Measure its circumference.

Wrap a string or tape measure around the tree trunk at chest height. Mark or measure where your string or tape measure meets the starting point and write down the number!

Find its height.

Find a stick as long as your forearm. Hold the stick upright while your arm is fully straightened in front of you and back away from the tree until the stick and tree are the same height. Then, measure the distance from the spot where you're standing to the base of the tree.









STONE EXPLORER

Stones tell stories! **Find a stone or rock.** Is it round or flat? Rough or smooth? Warm from the sun or cool from the shade?



7 TREE BARK DETECTIVE

Find a tree with bumpy bark at **Spring Lake Park**. **Place a blank piece of paper against the tree and rub a crayon over the paper** to make a bark rubbing!



fun fact

Beech trees have smooth, grey bark. Shagbark Hickory trees have shaggy bark that peels off the tree.

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WILDFLOWER BOUQUET

Look at the wildflowers around you. What colors do you see?

Use crayons, markers, or colored pencils to sketch the flowers you spotted!

2 SPIDERWEB WATCH

Found a spiderweb? Is it shaped like a circle or zig-zagged? Look closely (but don't touch!) and see how the spider weaves their web.

5 LEAF DETECTIVE

Find leaves of different shapes and sizes on the ground. **Merrill Park** is a great place to find a variety of leaves from trees like oaks, maples, and birches. **Use a blank piece of paper to make leaf rubbings.**

Remember: Look for leaves that have already fallen. Some leaves on trees or plants may be poisonous!



6 NATURE SCULPTURES

Collect sticks, stones, and other items around you to make a nature sculpture known as a cairn! Some ideas are a tiny fort, a friendly animal, or a cool pattern. When you're done, take a photo and put all items back where you found them.

You're almost ready to earn your badge! Here are some extra activities to enjoy as you wrap up your adventure.

1 PARK CLEANUP CHALLENGE

Become a Park Cleanup Hero by picking up litter! Write down what you find and earn a special cleanup sticker!

- Bring a trash bag and gloves.
- Explore the park and pick up litter.
- Write down the type of litter you find (like plastic or paper items).
- Submit a photo of your findings when you finish this book, and be sure to tie your trash bag and place it in an appropriate trash can.

STAY ON TRAILS

Help protect plants and animals by staying on marked paths with a grown-up.

2 WATER SAFETY

Stay out of rivers, ponds, and other waterways. If you're fishing, remember it's catch-and-release only.

3 LEAVE NO TRACE

Always clean up after yourself.

TAKE ONLY MEMORIES

Don't take anything from the parks like flowers, mushrooms, rocks, or pinecones.

5 RESPECT THE ANIMALS

Watch animals from a distance. Don't feed or disturb them.
